ACTIVITIES

Net vir Pret continued its work with children and youth in Barrydale and on the surrounding farms and ran 20 different programmes during the year under review; these are described below.

The **Girls Only** and the **Save the Redfin** programmes were new ventures.

The **PETS** workshops were run by **Dr. Michael Rice** of the **PETS Foundation**; Net vir Pret was the facilitating partner.

Renosterbos – the Day of Reconciliation Parade

The December giant puppet Parade is the highlight of the Net vir Pret year and is many months in the making. In 2017 the theme dealt with the plight of the endangered rhino who are being poached to

extinction for their horn. After months of research and a visit to spend time with the rhino at the **Sanbona Wildlife Reserve**, a story for the performance which follows the parade emerged, involving rhino parents and their youngster, a poaching syndicate led by the ruthless Lady Boss, corrupt officials, a rhino sanctuary and a young offender who sees the light and saves the baby rhino from certain death when a fire tears through the reserve.



The event was again directed by **Aja Marneweck** and run in partnership with the **Centre for Humanities Research at the University of the Western Cape**. The giant rhino puppets were designed and built by the **Ukwanda Puppetry Collective** from **Masipumelele**. We were also joined by 3 members from the **Mothertongue Project** based in McGregor.



The show was dedicated to the memory of one of their members, **Ncedile Daki**, who worked with us on the December show for many years and whose young life was tragically taken in a car hi-jacking last year.

Our own Net vir Pret team designed and built the smaller puppets, including a Fire Dragon which tore through the action setting everything ablaze.

The full cast numbered over 150, including 130 youngsters from the village and the surrounding farms. **Gari Crawford** and our jazz workshop contributed original music for the show and **Elton Esau** and his choir provided vocal backing.

Groups of young leaders were trained in the making of the medium and small puppets over many Saturdays so that they could lead the children later in making their own.

The event took place on 17 December and was attended by a huge crowd who had come from

far and wide to see it, including visitors from the **University of Toronto**. This was the first parade mounted on our own without the **Handspring Trust** and all agreed that it exceeded expectations. That it did so is a tribute to the Handspring team and their nurturing over a 7-year partnership. The parade now provides a focus each year for work across our different programmes, sparking creativity on every side, from story-telling, scripting and acting, to music, song and dance, as well as

the design, construction and manipulation of puppets, involving a wide range of participants of all ages from across the Barrydale community. It has become a precious instrument for the development of our youth and the healing of our fractured community and we look forward to many more over the years.

HOLIDAY SCHOOLS

Easter

Attended by 98 youngsters, the theme for 5-day Easter Holiday School was ***Pets and How to Care for Them***.



The programme opened with a visit from the **Karoo Animal Protection Society (KAPS)** who addressed youngsters on aspects of pet care. They also brought dogs with them to meet the children.



After a morning of drawing your favourite animal, the rest of the week was spent in groups devising stories about pets which were then scripted and rehearsed for performance on the final day, complete with props and costumes.

Winter



Rhinos were the focus of the July Holiday School, attended by 130 youngsters who drew rhino, made rhino puppets and came up with stories about rhino which were performed on the final day. In the second week, the Holiday School moved to the **Vlakte** farm where a similar programme attracted 55 youngsters.



In the third week 21 teenagers from the farms were invited to a residential 5-days at the farmhouse where they also learned about the rhino and their plight.

Spring



The 5-day October Holiday School was devoted as usual to cleaning up the hill which separates township from village. Over 50 black bags of rubbish were collected and then sorted into what could be recycled.



The youngsters then fashioned objects of interest and beauty from the recycled material under the guidance of the Craft Studio.

Summer

The Summer Holiday School opened with 3 weeks intensive preparations for the Renosterbos Puppet Show described above. After a recess over the festive season, the new year opened with a residential week of fun and learning at the farmhouse for 30 youngsters from surrounding farms.



The youngsters broke into 6 groups and the focus of activities was the development of a play around a chosen theme which was presented for all to enjoy on the final day.

We provide both breakfast and lunch to all participants in the Holiday Schools and in 2017 we were privileged to be supported by the **Lunchbox Fund** which provides nutritious foodstuff which forms the basis of the meals.

After-Care Programme

The Aftercare Programme, led by Youth Development Co-ordinator, **Sudonia Kouter** with help from **Clarisa Jonas** and the Interns, runs from 14h00 to 16h00 every weekday afternoon with up to 50 youngsters attending. The first hour is spent on the computers in the Homework Room where, under supervision of the Interns, the youngsters are able to access the Eduplay software which provides training in mathematics and languages for all grades. The second hour is spent in the Playroom where they engage in structured developmental activities, including art and craft and the Nal'ibali reading programme.



Pottery and Craft Studios



The Pottery Studio, led by **Jean Bittkau**, and the Craft Studio, led by **Cherie Dirksen**, both continue to produce work of high quality. The young potters mounted an exhibition of their work at the **Barrydale Blooms Festival** in October and the crafters exhibited their year's work at the **Barrydale Library** in December. The crafters created a range of decorative fridge magnets which **Judy Brown**, director of the British charity **EDSA**, took home with where they will be used for fundraising. **Michele Berry** continued to help with occasional fabric design and printing workshops.

Jazz Programme

Led by veteran teach **Gari Crawford**, our Jazz Programme continues to flourish and it's reach was expanded during the year with the acquisition of a trumpet and an alto sax through **Marion Barton**.



The young musicians play at the **Karoo Art Hotel** and at local restaurants. They also performed at the **Swellendam Mall** in September.



Drama

Following the

success of plays we have presented in recent years, drama has now become one of our core activities with groups running not only at the Net vir Pret base but also at three farm schools.

Directed by **Peter Takelo**, the Net vir Pret group developed **Die Rooi Doppie** - which refers to the red cap on a five litre plastic can of poisonously cheap red wine. The play deals with the ravaging effects of alcohol on our community. The play came first in **Overberg Drama Festival** and went on to the provincial finals in February 2018 where it received special commendation.

Drumming and Riel Dance

The Drumming and Riel Dance groups continued developing throughout the year, performing regularly at the **Karoo Art Hotel** and elsewhere. Invited to an Open Day at the **Drostdy Museum** in Swellendam, they performed to great acclaim.

Riel dancers and drummers also travelled to **Oudtshoorn** over Easter for the **KKnK Festival** where they gave street performances.

Bike Programme

The Bike Programme continues to be an important attraction for youngsters in the village and often provides their first entry to the centre from where they go on to participate in other activities.



The 50 bikes donated from the UK several years ago through the kind agency of **Noelle** and **Kevin Ablitt** are being maintained under the supervision of Intern **Anwill Speelman**. Nine of the youngsters cycled the 85 km to the sea-side resort at Witsand over rough dirt roads in February. The expedition was led by two of the Project Hope boys who maintained the lead to the end.

Girls Only

The new **Girls Only** programme was launched on Women's Day in August last year when Net vir Pret girls and their mothers were invited to a day of fun and self-discovery for both for daughters and mothers. The programme now meets regularly on Tuesdays under the guidance of **ACVV** social worker **Annaline Zilch**.

The programme aims to address the issues girls face in their formative teenage years and



at developing self-esteem and leadership skills. An essential element is the involvement not only of the girls but also of their mothers.

The year ended with a High Tea at a local coffee shop.



Save the Red Fin

Early in the year, local conservationists, **Prof. Les Minter** and **Flora Cameron** addressed Young Leaders on the plight of the red fin minnow in the **Huis River** which flows through the village. Unique to Barrydale, this species is under threat of extinction due to pollution which not only poisons the fish but also clogs up the flow the river.

In response, Net vir Pret youngsters signed up to create the **Save the Red Fin Club** which cleans the river on Wednesday afternoons. Under Flora's guidance, the youngsters have gone a long way in removing the trash from the river and attention is now being given to the invasive alien growth. An appeal has been made to the **Dept. Of Water Affairs** for help with training in the identification and eradication of alien vegetation and for funding for the purchase of chain saws and other equipment which will enable us to make a much more effective impact.

We have also agreed that the river and the red fin will provide the inspiration for the 2018 December Parade.



Homework Club



Interns and is proving a great attraction.

Thanks to support from **Detlef Klapthor** and the **Claude Leon Foundation**, we were able to extend the reach of our Homework Club by adding 8 new pc's to the computer lab, thus doubling the 8 we had from **Barrydale High School** last year. We were also able to load all with the **Eduplay** software which teaches Mathematics and Languages from Grades R to 12. The facility is in use every afternoon under supervision of staff and

Young Leaders

The 24 Young Leaders attended a structured weekly workshop on the principles of leadership during the year and played an essential part in the delivery of our programmes, working alongside staff.

Their role was crucial especially in holiday schools which were attended by up to 130 children and youth.

They participated fully in the lead up to the December Parade, learning how to construct the hand-held puppets which they would later guide the youngsters in making and several of them took lead roles in the performance.



Public Holiday Events

Freedom Day - April 27 Interns presented a short play to youngsters in celebration of the freedom which we enjoy in present-day South Africa in which the franchise is crucial.

Youngsters learned how the franchise works and they were invited to vote for their favourite Net vir Pret programme. Counsellors were on

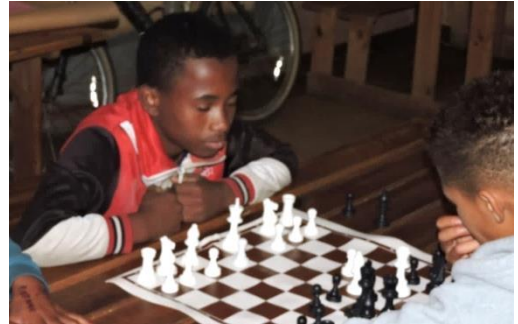


hand to help, together with voting booths and ballot boxes.

Youth Day - June 16 A day of games was held at the local sports field for youngsters. The day began



with a programme of traditional games, with a chess tournament available for those who preferred it, and ended with a rugby match. We were honoured by the presence of **Carol Beerwinkel**, member of the **Western Cape**



Provincial Parliament, who addressed the gathering.



Heritage Day - September 24. Net vir Pret mounted an all-day **Riel Dance Festival** with 20 groups participating. Two of the groups were based at Net vir Pret itself, and the remaining 18 came from other centres, including 3 farm schools. All groups had been set up by Net vir Pret during the year.

A substantial crowd turned up to watch and our thanks go to **Swanns Busdiens** for sponsoring the event.

The Net vir Pret Senior Group of dancers are the agents who train the novice groups and the success of the event was a tribute to their work.



Internships

Four new Interns joined us in March; **Natasha Christoffels**, **Catherine Kortje**, **Chriselda le Roux** and **Selanvor Platjies**. **Charl Jonas**, a 2016 Intern, was appointed for a second term.

The Interns worked with children and youngsters alongside staff in all programmes. They were required to take charge of the 50 children who attended the daily aftercare programme on Wednesdays when staff were away on training at **Boland College** in Caledon and they also supervised the Homework Club

They conducted research

into the rhino and constructed *Wat is jou Choice.....* a wall-newspaper on the theme which was on display at the **Barrydale Library**, the local schools and other central points in the village. They have also carried responsibility for groups at the Holiday Schools.

As a special project they were called upon to improvise a play which could tour schools on a theme of social



concern. This resulted in ***Wat is jou Choice?*** (What is your choice?), a 40 min. play which tackled problems of discipline in the classroom and which played at schools in the Overberg, giving 16 performances in total.

Farm School Outreach

The **Farm School Outreach Programme** ran on four mornings a week with the **Lemoenshoek, Vleiplaas, Weltevrede** and **Akkerboom Farm Schools** being visited in turn.

All sessions were broken into two parts, story-telling and arts and crafts run by **Peter Takelo**, while **Angelo Endley** worked alongside with a sports programme.

In 2017 riel dance groups formed at all these schools and a new development was the formation of drama groups, all nurtured by Net vir Pret, which performed for one another at a mini-festival at the end of the year.



Project Hope

Project Hope began in mid-2016 as an initiative to minister to a group of 16 boys who had dropped out of school and come into conflict with the law. Initially attracted to our Bike Club, the boys gradually became integrated into the wider Net vir Pret community and astounded everyone by announcing after the Christmas recess that they all wanted to go back to school.

In the end 14 of the boys were admitted to school in January 2017 but the complication was that it was decided to place them according to their age and not their scholastic level. This resulted in all finding themselves completely out of their depth and in a situation where in effect they had been set up to fail. Boys who had been in Grade 2 when they dropped out, now found themselves in Grade 4.



We organised after-school support for them but as the months passed it became clear that the obstacles placed before them were insurmountable and we feared that none would survive the year.

In August in a test of strength and will-power, 6 of the Project Hope boys accompanied by 2 Young Leaders cycled the gruelling 65 km to Montagu. The ride took 4 hours

and included negotiating the cruel 5 km steep incline of the Op de Tradauw Pass. All completed the ride and a celebratory dinner was held for them and their mothers in the following week.

Although by year's end most were no longer attending school, amazingly 5 of the youngsters did make it and returned to school in 2018.



The remaining 9 boys have stayed with us and with the help of retired special needs teacher, **Andries Truter**, they were given daily classes in basic literacy and numeracy. Staff member, **Herman Witbooi**, was given overall responsibility for the programme. He has

established a carpentry workshop with them and they have also begun to establish a food garden at the Net vir Pret farmhouse. With this in mind, they visited the **van Wyksdorp** branch of the **Gouritz Cluster Biosphere Reserve** in early March to learn about preparing beds for planting and raising seedlings. A few newcomers have joined and there are now 14 in the group.

Matric Outreach and Bursary Programmes

The **Matric Outreach Programme** counselled youngsters in their final school year on options for further study and provided assistance with applications to institutions, for financial support, and finally with procedures on registration day, including transport to and from Cape Town in the Net vir Pret bus. The **Bursary Programme** aimed to provide emergency assistance when NSFAS, the state financial aid system, fell short.

13 new students entered tertiary institutions in 2018 with our help and another youngster took up an



apprenticeship at **TMS International**, thanks to the support of **Detlef Klapthor**. [Off to study in Cape Town](#)

The following table shows the growing number of young people from

Barrydale who are progressing to further study with Net vir Pret's help and presents details of the new students as well as of continuing students and graduates. It would be true to say that before we initiated this intervention 6 years ago, virtually no youngsters from our village were going on to tertiary study.

The PETS Programme

Our partnership with PETS entered its fifth year. In 2017 the focus was on emergent reading and emergent mathematics. With assistance of educators from Net vir Pret, the **Vleiplaas** and **Akkerboom Farm Schools**, and the local **BF Oosthuizen Primary School**, **Dr. Michael Rice** worked on developing an interactive 8-module internet



course entitled **It Begins At Birth** for practising teachers, ECD practitioners, caregivers and Home Schooling parents which would be hosted on the E-classroom website www.e-classroom.co.za. The course covers how children start becoming literate at birth and continue the process throughout life through a combination of cognitive development and interaction with their environment. It includes speaking, story-telling, reading and writing, as well as emergent mathematics, with which it shares many similar concepts.

PETS also sponsored a visit by **Linda Bruce** who ran a marathon 4-hour workshop for teachers on **Social and Emotional Learning**.

In a record for Barrydale, 43 educators attended, drawn from both the high and primary schools, four farm schools and Net vir Pret. The workshop generated much interest.



Other News

- Staff members **Donna Kouter**, **Angelo Endley** and Intern **Charl Jonas** were invited by **UNIMA** to participate in a week-long workshop in May with the Mexican puppetry group **La Liga** which culminated in a performance in the **Company Gardens** featuring startling wolf puppets.



- Dawn Garisch** ran a sponsored 5-day **Life Writing Workshop** for staff and Interns in late March which was also attended by **Ulla Mussnug**, long-time supporter of our work who has recently published an account of her childhood in Namibia. Several participants said that they hadn't realised before that they could write and that the process had been exciting and therapeutic. The scripting of both the **Renosterbos** play and the Interns' **Wat is jou choice?** also benefited from the workshop.



- Thanks to sponsorship from the **Max Kohler Trust** and **Gordon Browning**, we were able to replace our aging bakkie (pick-up truck) after many years of service with a new model.
