16:00 - 17:30 Panel 4: Critical Materialities: Puppetry, Aesthetics and a New Kinetics of Sense and Form

The panel engages the critical materialities and kinaesthetic performativities of puppetry and the kinetic object. Through the proposition of the 'minor as method', we seek out points of complementarity, interstitiality, tension, dialogue, ambivalence and generosity between transhemispheric critical-creative approaches that might enable a generative re-thinking of aesthetic education in a post-apartheid South Africa. As separate and yet not distinct instances of thought, we approach the critical dynamic of the performing and kinetic object as an aestheticpolitical potentiality that marks the shape of post-apartheid and postcolonial futures. This is also about thinking with resources that are readily at hand. Aesthetic practice elicits new readings and new concepts, as we are confronted with the task of re-thinking the human and how we might conceive of the kinetic object and puppetry as sites to read and comprehend the dynamics of change in South Africa. What can an aesthetic education offer in establishing new collaborations between publics, communities, artists, students and humanities scholars to understand new forms of subjectivity adequate to a practice of post-apartheid freedom. As we continue to envision and grow approaches to exploring the performative aesthetics of sense and form through the kinetic object at Greatmore, we invite reflections on some critical questions around puppetry and its potential to invite movement, form and meaning to aesthetic freedom, thought and practice in the 21st Century.
